Summer Maintenance

Each year we tackle various projects to ensure that Natures continues to be a well maintained park that we can be proud of. This year we had 2 main projects that we had scheduled to be done during the summer when there are the least number of people in the park who will be impacted by the inconvenience.

Road Repair:

The road immediately inside the gate is an area that receives the most use and abuse. Any large vehicles, especially the trash truck, that come in and immediately make a left or right turn tend to tear up the blacktop, and it was time to have that area re-paved. There were also a couple of areas in the park that needed to be patched.

Big Pool Re-plaster:

Re-plastering the big pool is a huge undertaking and it had more than its share of frustration to our full time residents!

The pool was emptied, and then the noisy, messy job of chipping out the old plaster was started. Although the volley ball pool was available for use, the noise and dust created by the workers made it unpleasant to be in the pool area.

Once the chipping was finished, all the old plaster had to be shoveled into buckets and manually carted out of the pool and loaded in a trailer to be disposed of. Then the pool had to be washed and the last of the dust and sludge removed.

During this process we were frustrated to have a number of days when the workers failed to show up to work. This stretched what should have been about a week into two weeks.

That was not the end of our frustration. The workers did not do a very good job of picking up all the loose pieces of plaster, so Misty put out an SOS asking for help, adding a bribe of ice cream and brownies after the work party. Once again our wonderful volunteers came through, and in about 20 minutes, a large group of people had the bottom of the pool completely clean. This would have been a big job for one person, but was made easy and fun - there was a lot of joking and laughter - when it was tackled by many people. A big thank you to our volunteers for their labor, and to Laurie for making sure that everyone received their bribe when the work was complete.

The workers did a great job of chipping around the "NR" in the pool, but the turtles were a little more difficult, and there were a few amputations. Fortunately the amputated limbs were able to be reattached with surgical precision, so the turtles survived!

The next frustration was "the supply chain". The contractor was not able to get sufficient plaster for the job, so work was delayed for a further 4 days.

Eventually the BIG day arrived. Eight men showed up at 6:30 a.m. to plaster the pool. They worked almost non-stop until about 3 p.m. and the ugly pool was transformed into a beautiful new pool. Immediately they were finished, three hoses were run into the pool, and by 10 a.m. the next morning the pool was once again full, albeit with somewhat murky water.
